# **NOA PROGRAMS & SERVICES**

Many of you have been NOA supporters since the beginning, many of you have joined along the way, and many of you may only have learned about NOA recently. NOA has grown and expanded over the years, so we would like to share a brief overview of the activities and services our agency provides to update our longtime friends and help our new friends be aware of the comprehensive list of services offered.

NOA services address the many problems faced by victims of domestic violence beyond the initial crisis call.

NOA not only offers emergency shelter, but also offers a multitude of support services needed by

those that do not require shelter.

# NOA's Support Services & Programs Include:

NOA served 1,704 men, women and children in 2021

**24/7 Crisis Line:** The NOA crisis line is the first point of contact to reach much needed help, information and support. Each call offers linkage to confidential emotional support, safe shelter, safety planning, community and safety

resources. In 2021, NOA staff responded to 3,289 crisis calls.





Emergency Shelter: The safe confidential shelter is available 24/7, as a key component of the program, which also includes the provision of food, clothing, personal necessities, medical assistance and emergency financial assistance. In 2021, NOA housed 102 people and sheltered 30 victims in local motels due to lack of space at the NOA shelter.

Individual Trauma Counseling: Trauma counseling is provided by a licensed counselor to help clients overcome Post Traumatic stress, depression, anxiety and to regain a sense of control over their lives. Counseling is offered in a group setting as well. In 2021, 176 women, and 126 children attended individual counseling and support groups, in Dawson and Lumpkin Counties.

<u>Legal Advocacy:</u> NOA offers support and information about victim rights and legal options, assistance in filing Temporary Protective Orders [TPO's], accompanying clients to court, education about the judicial process, legal representation and referrals. Legal advocates assisted with 138 protective orders this past year.

<u>Emergency Financial Assistance:</u> Financial assistance is available to assist victims with relocation, transportation costs, rent, utilities, transportation and childcare. In 2021, NOA provided over \$194,919 to victims in need.

# NOA PROGRAMS CONTINUED



Children's Program: A primary goal of the NOA children's program is to address the impact of traumatic stress which profoundly affects the development of children. This is accomplished through weekly nurturing therapeutic activities to increase emotional vocabulary, develop safety plans, and foster healing. NOA advocates also meet individually with the parents of children of trauma to teach and encourage healing at home. 144 victims received

1,083 individual trauma counseling sessions and 176 women and 126 children attended weekly support groups.

Georgia as a State has recently received an unfortunate designation as being third in the country for the percentage of teenagers in an abusive relationship. We are currently collaborating with the schools in Lumpkin and Dawson Counties to educate students about healthy relationships and provide them with information about resources available to them.

Parents, we urge to talk to your kids and educate them about healthy relationships.

The School Violence Prevention Program: This program uses a variety of school curricula to teach violence prevention to students by building their knowledge and internal assets to protect them against violence at home and in personal relationships. In 2021, advocates spoke to 1,925 children in elementary, middle and high school settings on topics such as family violence, bullying, healthy relationships, dating violence and electronic safety.



<u>Community Outreach Program</u>: Outreach efforts aim to raise awareness of domestic violence through community partnerships with criminal justice and social service agencies, schools, civic organizations, churches and other groups. NOA advocates talked to 49 organizations and churches in 2021 concerning NOA services and information about domestic violence.

<u>Life Skills Group:</u> Weekly support groups teach victims important life skills such as budgeting, parenting, cooking, resume building, stress management, women's health options and finding ways to reduce anxiety. In 2021, advocates conducted 52 life skills groups.

Long Term Housing Program: This project addresses the need for safe and permanent housing that often arises when victims separate from their abuser. This project provides financial assistance, education and resources to relocate people into permanent housing, and/or assist victims to remain in permanent housing. Assistance with security deposits, first and last month's rent, utility deposits and payments, will provide the support victims need to live independent and productive lives. NOA enrolled 24w clients into the long term housing program in 2021.

# Dear fellow NOA supporters,

NOA is very excited to announce that land has been purchased and we have officially begun the New Shelter Building Capital Campaign.

NOA has been fortunate in that our current shelter is graciously donated by the Lumpkin County Board of Commissioners and while we are very thankful to have had this facility to call our shelter for over 20 years, we are busting at the seams as this shelter is a very small house with three bedrooms and two bathrooms to share between 12 women and children.

NOA served 1,704 clients in 2021 and sheltered 132 women, men and children (men are sheltered in nearby motels). Our shelter remained full the majority of the year and it became very overwhelming to try and allow for social distancing when families often times share rooms. During the beginning months of 2021 when we were having both clients and staff sick with COVID, we decided to only have 1 family per room and we noticed a drastic difference in the healing process. Clients were able to focus on their trauma and relayed that they felt safe and we also noticed the conflict that usually occurred between the residents was virtually eliminated. Community living is very difficult, especially given that these women and children are very vulnerable and are in crisis mode.

With this knowledge in hand, we have a vision to build an inviting shelter with individual spaces for both single women as well as rooms dedicated for women with children, allowing them the space they need to heal and overcome the trauma that they have experienced. We will also have several spaces dedicated for counseling, children's' programs as well as life skills and parenting classes. We are focusing on building a shelter with a holistic mindset, but in order to make our vision a reality we need the help of our long time supporters as well as our Dawson & Lumpkin county community members.

# MAKING A DIFFERENCE

Scholarship Program: NOA can sponsor women who are survivors of domestic violence through the Sunshine Lady Foundation's Women's Independence Scholarship Program. Their scholarships help survivors of domestic violence



complete a college educational experience that will result in a secure and sufficient employment, and provide the footing they need to turn their dreams into a reality. NOA sponsored 2 women in 2021, and secured \$2,000 in funding to assist them with tuition and living expenses.



# Volunteer Program:

Volunteers are a resource and vital part of the strategy for fulfilling the mission of NOA. We value our volunteers as they diversify and expand

the services offered to our clients, families and the community.

In 2021, active volunteers, interns and members of the board contributed 4,195 hours of service.



NOA's Vision: Create a community with zero tolerance for all forms of violence and abuse.

Mary was referred to NOA by a local counseling agency after relaying an incident of violence to her counselor. She called the NOA crisis line and was immediately encouraged to come into shelter for her safety and the safety of her children. Mary was hesitant to come into shelter, but decided to come in and do an intake. After meeting with an advocate who completed a lethality assessment which revealed a high risk of lethality, she decided it was the best thing for her and her children to come into shelter.

Once settled into shelter, she was taken, by an advocate, to the sheriff's office to file a police report. As a result, her abuser was arrested. The next day, our legal advocate assisted her in obtaining a Temporary Protective Order to provide further protection for her and her minor children. NOA was also able to retain an attorney to represent her at the final hearing where she was granted a 12 month Protective Order.

We further assisted her financially with childcare which allowed her to work. NOA provided clothes from our thrift store for her and her children. As time passed, she began to be more relaxed and less anxious about her situation. She attended support group and individual counseling during her stay at the shelter. Her children also attended the children's support group as well. Mary also took advantage of parenting and life skills classes during her stay at the shelter. As her stay at the shelter was drawing to an end, we assisted her with deposits for electricity and water allowing her to move into her new home.

Upon leaving shelter and moving into her own home, NOA advocates continued to assist her with case management on a non-residential basis by attending divorce hearings and custody hearings, providing the support needed to allow her to navigate through the daunting processes that come through our complex judicial system.

When she came to our agency, this victim was a stay-at-home mom with no access to family resources. She had no support system and her abuser was a very controlling, jealous and violent alcoholic. As a result, she was unable to pursue any dreams or personal goals in her life and she lived in constant fear of his disapproval and anger.

She is now divorced, attending school, maintaining a job, and making wonderful progress in her recovery from the trauma of domestic violence. Her kids are also doing great and she can now live her life in a way that is healthy and safe for her family.
